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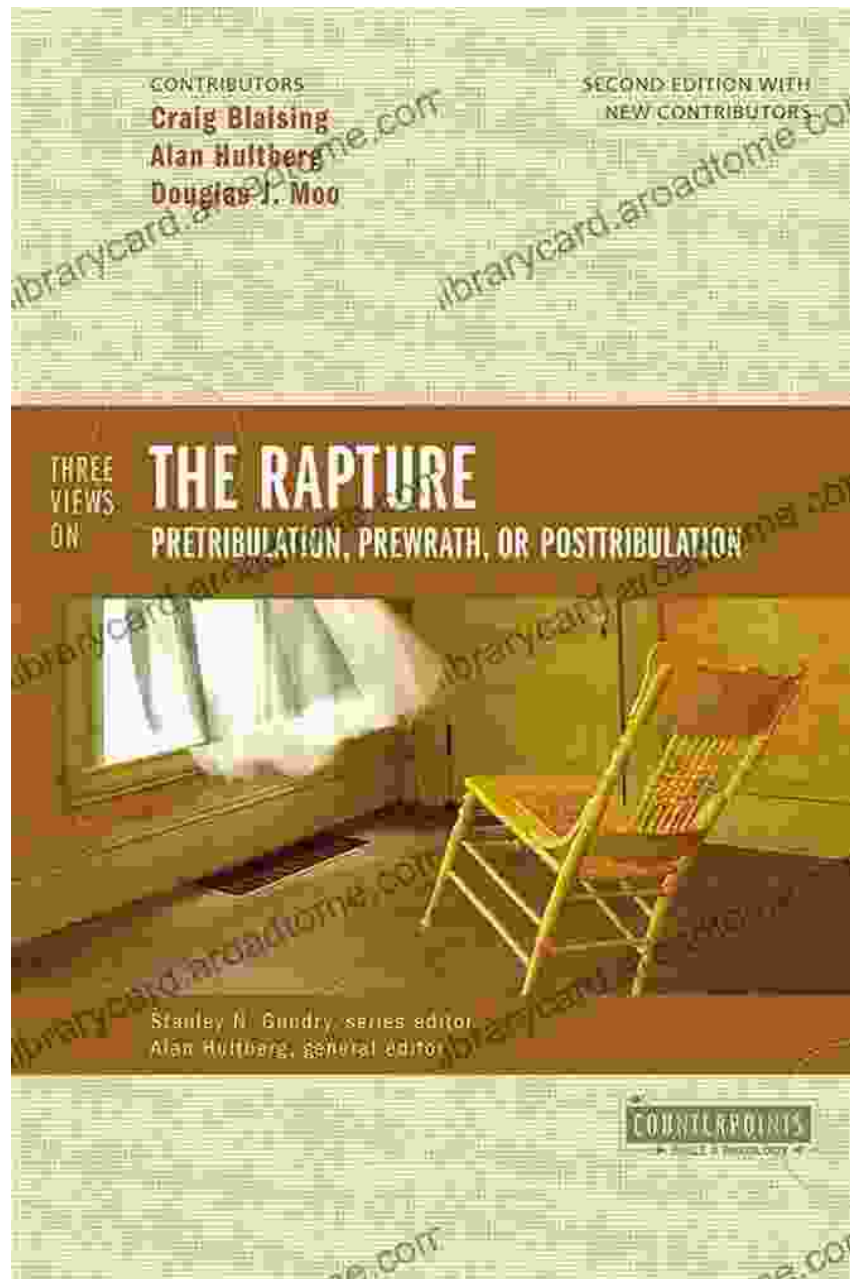

Pre-Tribulation Rapture

Proponents of the pre-tribulation rapture believe that Christ will return to gather his Church before the seven-year period of tribulation described in the book of Revelation begins. This view is based on the idea that the Church is distinct from Israel and will be spared from the time of judgment that will come upon the world.



Pre-tribulationists often cite passages such as 1 Thessalonians 4:16-17 and 1 Corinthians 15:51-52 as evidence for this belief. They argue that these verses indicate a sudden, unexpected event that will occur before the onset of the tribulation period.

Mid-Tribulation Rapture

FIVE DIFFERENT VIEWS ON THE RAPTURE

Basic definitions of the most common beliefs about when the Rapture will happen.

PRE-TRIBULATION The Rapture will take place before the time of wrath (called the Tribulation) comes. The Church is removed from the whole period of Tribulation—the entire seven years.	MID-TRIBULATION The Rapture of Christians will take place at the midpoint of the seven-year Tribulation period (3 1/2 years).
PARTIAL RAPTURE Suggests multiple raptures that will occur throughout the Tribulation period based on the level of faithfulness of each person.	PRE-WRATH The Rapture will happen 5 1/2 years into the Tribulation period. This view places the Rapture of Christians between the sixth and seventh seals described in the book of Revelation.
POST-TRIBULATION The Church will go through the entire Tribulation, but be preserved from the wrath of God, the divine wrath, only to be taken up very quickly prior to the Second Coming of Christ to the earth and to meet Him in the air and come back to the earth with Him.	

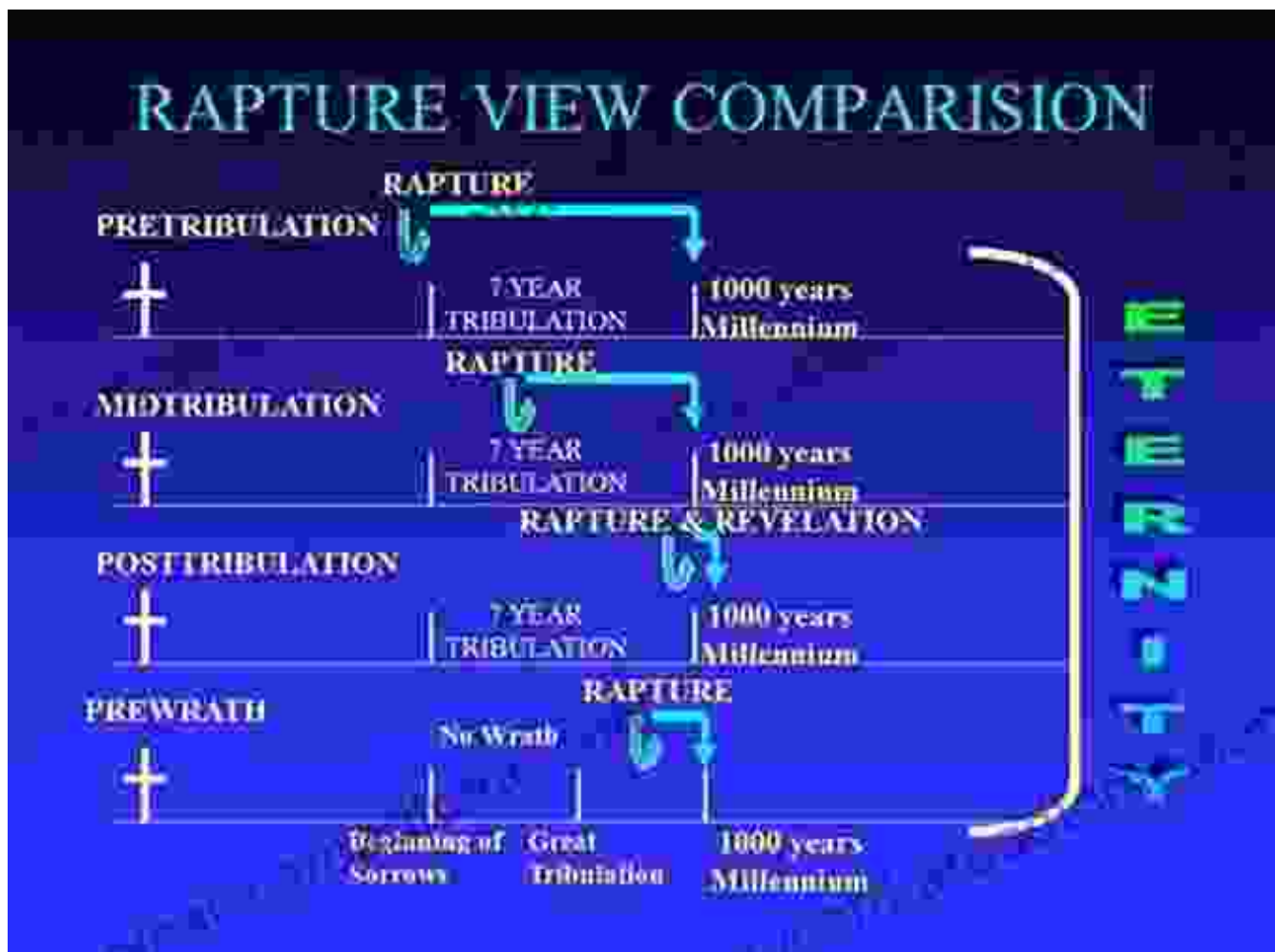
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Mid-tribulationists often refer to passages such as Revelation 13:5 and 14:12-13 as evidence for this view. They argue that these verses suggest

that the saints will experience a period of persecution and suffering during the first half of the tribulation but will be delivered from the final three and a half years.

Post-Tribulation Rapture

Post-tribulationists believe that Christ will return to gather his Church after the seven-year tribulation period has ended. This view is based on the idea that the Church will go through the tribulation as a witness to the world and will be glorified with Christ after the final judgment.



Post-tribulationists often cite passages such as Matthew 24:29-31 and Revelation 7:14-17 as evidence for this view. They argue that these verses

indicate that the saints will endure the entire tribulation period but will be protected and preserved by God.

Implications and Applications

The different views on the rapture have significant implications for Christian living and eschatological expectations. Pre-tribulationists may emphasize the importance of being watchful and ready for Christ's sudden return. Mid-tribulationists may encourage perseverance and faithfulness during times of persecution.
