- **Zoey**, an emotional support dog who helps her owner, a veteran with PTSD, cope with anxiety

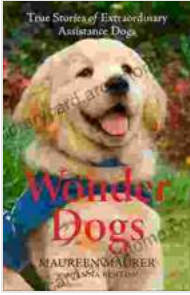

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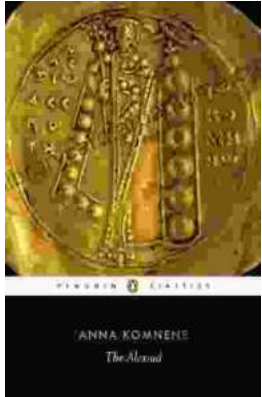
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
